Despite these remarkable successes, challenges persist in West Pokot County with the high cost of living compounded by recent drought has left many children without basic needs, threatening to derail their educational aspirations. However, in Suam sub-county, the 'Come Twende Shule' campaign has seen remarkable success, with 200 children re-enrolling in school. This achievement is attributed to the implementation of various interventions such as the cash transfer program. Families, now financially supported for uniforms, fees,

and other essentials, are increasingly seeking education for their children, marking a significant shift in mindset and priorities.

Ongoing follow-ups are underway to determine the precise number of re-enrolled children since the campaign's initiation in 2023. Alfred Kamuto, West Pokot KUPPET Secretary-General, credits the 'Come Twende Shule' campaign for supporting the re-enrolment of many children.

The initiative has not only revitalized the education sector but has also fostered community resilience and empowerment, paving the way for a brighter future for generations to come.
